<b>Holiday!</b>	<p><b>Literacy</b> <b>Comprehension</b> Watch the film Present carefully. Discuss and answer the questions.</p> <p><b>Reading</b> <b>Numeracy</b></p> <p><b>We are learning to split an object in half.</b></p> <p>Use an apple or any other fruit at home to illustrate this. Cut it equally in half. Try with potato, or a biscuit. Both parts must be equal. It's great to get some examples when this is not the case. You can't have a "bigger half"! If the parts are not equal, then they are not halves. You could give your child some simple paper shapes: circle, square, triangle, rectangle, and ask them to fold those to show halves. Show them how to line up edges neatly. Is there only way to fold shapes in half? Think about the film you saw yesterday. Write what you saw happening. Say your sentences first. Remember to use <b>capital letters</b> and a <b>full stops</b>. You can use words "<b>and</b>" or "<b>but</b>" to link your ideas. What is your last sentence going to be? Draw a picture to go with your writing.</p> <p><b>Reading</b></p> <p><b>Numeracy</b> <b>We are learning about quarters.</b></p> <p>Ask your child if they know what a quarter is. Show them how to cut an apple in half and then cut each in half again. Now you have quarters – 4 equal parts.
