Give your child instructions like: Go forward 2 steps. Turn quarter turn right. Go forward 5. Turn clockwise half turn and so on. Get them to give you instructions to get from the back door to the shed, or any other furniture outside. Write down instructions how to get from your bedroom to the kitchen. Remember to include turns and the number of steps. Number your instructions. Challenge- clockwise sheet.</p> <p>The grid</p>	<p>Literacy Writing- I can write a description. Remember the film yesterday? There were lots of different settings in it. Choose a setting and write a description for people that didn't see it (road, garden, ice, factory). Include colours and features you can see, noises you can hear and even feelings that you feel when looking at the setting. We are looking for WOW words in this. Can your teacher guess which scene you chose?</p> <p>Reading Numeracy</p> <p>We are learning about grids. Grids are squares overlayed over maps for navigation. They help locate objects and destinations quickly. To read grids, we start at the bottom left corner and go along first, then up. Star wars grid.</p> <p>Challenge. Make a grid for your friend to complete. Put your favourite toys in it.</p> <p>The grid</p>	<p>Numeracy and Mathematics Capacity –Today we are measuring water and comparing non-standard units of measure such as jugs and mugs. Have a towel ready to mop up or you might want to do this activity outdoors! You will need a selection of containers and some water. The pictures are just suggestions so adapt it for what you have available. On p.18 please estimate how many before you measure. On p.19 decide the best measure and cross out the one you're not using. P.20 is written only, using the information given, so no water this time! [Worksheets to be uploaded]</p> <p>Literacy Proper nouns are names of individual people places and things and always have a capital letter at the start.</p> <p>As part of a walk around your local area, look for signs showing the names of different streets. Talk with your child about the street names. You could take paper and a pen with you and make a note of some of the street names you see.</p>	<p>Finish and submit</p>

			<p>If you live in a more rural area, can you find on a map /remember the names of the roads you drive along/pass to get to school?Ask your child if they can list all the different 'endings' for street names that they find. For example, ... Road, ...Place ... Gardens.</p> <p>Back at home, encourage your child to sketch on paper a street map for an imaginary place. Can they think of a name for their development, village or town?</p> <p>Encourage your child to name each of the streets on their map. They can use some of the street names you found together or they could try naming the streets themselves. Use your own surname or the names of friends or relatives. Have fun – there could be a Scott Road or an Amelie Avenue!</p>	
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
